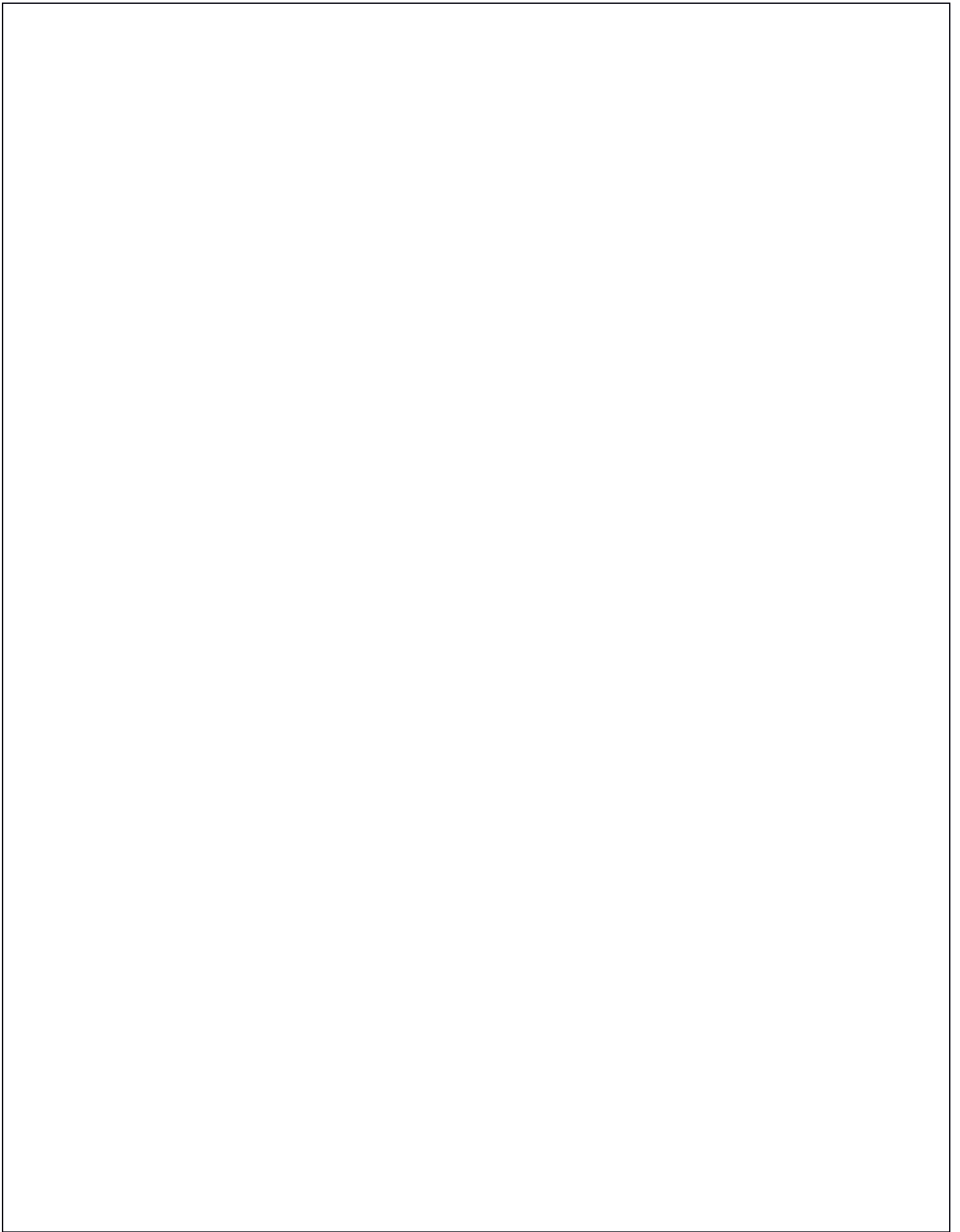

PR Card :-

Permanent Resident Card is the first important document we to make those who come through point system to Canada . The document required for the same are 1. The Passport with Visa stamped page , 2. The Landing Paper copy (Its to be kept always for future references), 3.The PR Card will be send to our address which we given in the airport at time of arrival within 6 weeks .

SIN Card :-

Social Insurance Number Card is also one of the important card to get ready in Canada . The documents for this is the same as PR . The Social Insurance number must keep as possible as confidential and safe.

N:B – The above mentioned cards not advised to carry in the local travelling , but PR Card is the document to do international travel .

### **3. Service Ontario**

The main services in Service Ontario are **a.** Health Card , **b.**Birth Certificate **c.** Driving License renewal , **d.** Registration of Vehicle , **e.** Updating photos and address on OHIP and Driving License **f.** Paying Taxes for Vehicle **g.** Marriage Certificate etc..

**a. Health Card** - The Ontario Health Card (OHIP) card is issued by Service Ontario. The Ontario Health Card (OHIP) is a health card which gives access to all medical and hospital service in the province of Ontario. It takes max. 2 months to receive the Health card in the mail after applying . Please to the website for all information .

**b. Birth Certificate :-** The birth certificate can apply online through the following websites , 1. <https://www.ontario.ca/serviceontario> and select Identification and Certificates option . Then select the ‘Register a baby ’and proceed as per the information because the birth must be registered in Ontario to use this service. Please use the 4-in-1 Newborn Bundle if you have not registered the birth of your child and the child is less than 1 year old.. To register a new baby’s birth and in one transaction: get a birth certificate apply for a social insurance number (SIN) and sign up for Canada child benefits (including Ontario child benefits) This is called the 4-in-1 Newborn Bundle.

**c. Driving License renewal** - An Ontario driver’s license is valid for 5 years. You need to renew it every 5 years either online (if eligible) or at a Service

Ontario centre. You can renew a driver’s license, online or at a Service Ontario centre , as early as 180 days before it expires and up to 12 months after it expires. For renewing we need to bring the active D. License . The cost is \$80 . The fees may vary if you are over 76 years of age.

Payment can be do in online using Visa, Master Card, American Express, or Interac® Online. Delivery of the new will be posted in 4 to 6 weeks.

**d.Registration of Vehicle:-** If you are buying a new vehicle from a dealership, the vehicle registration will usually be completed by the dealer.If you are buying a USED VEHICLE , you will need TO REGISTER the vehicle within 6 days of the sale at a ServiceOntario centre.To register a vehicle and get a permit and licence plate, you need:your driver's licence or your registrant identification number (RIN) the completed USED VEHICLE information package (only when registering a passenger vehicle, light commercial vehicle, self-propelled motor home or motorcycle)proof of purchase (e.g., a receipt from the seller or portion of used vehicle information package that can be used as a bill of sale) proof of insurance from an Insurance provider licensed in Ontario the original vehicle permit from seller with completed transfer portion the plate portion of the permit, if you are already have a licence plate.To get a licence plate sticker, you will need:Safety Standards certificate (not required for trailers, mopeds, off-road vehicles or snowmobiles) ,Drive Clean vehicle emissions test.

**e. Updating photos and address on OHIP and Driving License:-** These facilities are available directly in Service Ontario centers . You have to carry a payment method as either cash or debit/credit cards and the driving license .

**f. Paying Taxes for Vehicle :-** These facilities are available directly in Service Ontario centers . You have to carry a payment method as either cash or debit/credit cards , the driving license and Owners Certificate .

**g. Marriage Certificate:-** This certificate can be get ready online by login to <http://www.ontario.ca/government/identification-and-certificates> and proceed with the correct option . Also we can do it directly through the Service Ontario centers .

#### **4. Child Care Tax Benefit (CCTB ):-**

The Canada child tax benefit (CCTB) is a non-taxable amount paid monthly to help eligible families with the cost of raising children under 18 years of age. Family net income is one of the factors used in the calculation of your CCTB entitlement. The net income from their tax return is added to your net income to determine your family net income.

**A. *To be eligible, you must meet all the following conditions:*** You must live with the child, and the child must be under the age of 18; You must be primarily responsible for the care and upbringing of the child; You must be a resident of Canada; and you or your spouse or common-law partner must be a Canadian

citizen, a permanent resident, a protected person, or a temporary resident who has lived in Canada for the previous 18 months, and who has a valid permit in the 19th month. The person who is primarily responsible for the care and upbringing of the child should apply for the CCTB.

**B. *You should apply even if:*** Your child only lives with you part of the time, see shared custody.

Your child is living with you for a temporary period of time, for example over the summer holidays. Your current adjusted family net income is too high. We recalculate

your entitlement every July based on your adjusted family net income for the previous year.

***C. How do I apply for the Canada child tax benefit?*** If you are the parent of a newborn, living in a participating province, you may apply for the CCTB using the Automated Benefits Application (ABA) service. You will find all the information you need to use the ABA service in the provincial/territorial birth registration package provided by your province or territory. If you do not live in a participating province, you can apply online on My Account by using the Apply for child benefits service or complete Form RC66, Canada Child Benefits Application. You can get the form through the following website procedure :- a. <http://www.cra-arc.gc.ca/> , Select :- a. English , b. Apply for benefits , c. Canada child tax benefit (CCTB) , d. Application and eligibility , e. 8. How do I apply for

the Canada child tax benefit? and download the Form RC66, Canada Child Benefits Application. Or directly the link - <http://www.cra-arc.gc.ca/E/pbg/tf/rc66/README.html> . The filled form have to send to this address for Toronto - Sudbury Tax Centre , 1050 Notre Dame Avenue , Sudbury ON P3A 5C1 . You can select the address near your city using the web link - <http://www.cra-arc.gc.ca/bnfts/on-eng.html> . The customer care number is - 1-800-387-1193 . Normally the customer care center representative will talk only to mother of the children . Also we have to get ready the details like SIN card , PR Card or

Landing paper copy if you have , Passport for date of birth , the date of arrival etc..  
before you call .

## **6. Canadian Etiquettes(Manners):-**



Etiquette: Common courtesy, as practiced anywhere in the world, is also much appreciated in Canada. Polite requests for services or attention generally means you will be cared for in the same manner. Smiles, patience and a friendly approach are appreciated anywhere you travel.

### Meeting and Greeting

- In general, Canadians are more reserved and polite and take matters of etiquette a little more seriously.
- The most common greeting is the handshake. Shake hands and introduce yourself when meeting Canadians for the first time. Always shake hands firmly when meeting or departing and accompanied by direct eye contact and a sincere smile
- When a woman enters or leaves a room, it is polite for men to rise. Men may offer their hand to a woman without waiting for her to extend hers first .
- In Quebec, kissing on the cheeks in the French manner is quite common. When close friends and family meet in Quebec, they use first names and kiss both cheeks.
- An older French Canadian man may kiss the hand of a woman. Accept this gesture graciously. A foreign man shouldn't kiss the hand of a French Canadian woman, who would be quite shocked.

- Use last names and appropriate titles until invited by your Canadian hosts or colleagues to use their first names. First names are normally used only by close friends and family. Western Canadians may use first names more frequently than other Canadians.
- In Quebec, coworkers of similar status generally use first names in private, but always last names in The most common greeting is the handshake.
- Canadians appreciate politeness and expect others to adhere to the proper protocol for any given situation.
- Wait until invited before using someone's first name although Canadians tend to move to a first-name basis rapidly.
- Canadian businesspeople often begin relationships in a reserved manner;

once people get to know one another it becomes friendly and informal.

- Honorific titles and surnames are usually not used. Business cards are exchanged after the initial introduction.
- Examine any card you receive before putting it in your card case.

Language:-English and French are both official languages of business in Canada.

However, virtually all international business is conducted in English.

Body Language

- Canadians generally don't touch very much when conversing. Maintaining a certain amount of personal space is important.

- French Canadians are generally more animated and expressive than other Canadians.
- Take off your hat or sunglasses when speaking with someone.
- Some gestures have different meanings in Quebec. For example, "thumbs down" is considered offensive in Quebec, as is slapping an open palm over a closed fist. Like the rest of their countrymen and women, French-Canadians use the "thumbs up" sign to mean "okay." The "okay" sign made with the index finger and thumb means "zero" in Quebec.
- In Quebec, sit straight with your legs crossed at the knee, or with your knees together. Don't sit with your legs apart, or with your feet propped up on tables or chairs.
- It's considered bad form by many in Quebec to talk with your hands in your pockets.
- Sneeze or blow your nose as quietly as possible using a handkerchief or tissue. If possible, leave the room. Do not yawn, pick your nose or scratch in public. Toothpicks nail clippers, and combs are never used in public.

#### Corporate Culture

- Punctuality is demanded for business meetings and social occasions. If a conflict arises, you are expected to let your Canadian counterpart know immediately. That said, Canadians are not as obsessed with time as

Americans.

- Business cards are commonly exchanged in Canada. For Quebec, print your business cards in English or French, including your academic degree(s) and/or title. A double-sided business card (one side in English, one side in French) is best.
  - Canadians get down to business quickly. Meetings are well-organized, and extraneous discussion is kept to a minimum. A premium is placed on time.
  - Business communication is quite direct in Canada. Letters and telephone calls should be direct and succinct. Pleasantries are dispensed with very quickly.
- 
- Canadians begin meetings with a minimal amount of small talk although one should expect to spend a few minutes exchanging pleasantries and the like. In Quebec there may be more time spent on relationship-building.
  - Meetings are generally well-organized and adhere to time schedules. They tend to be informal and relaxed in manner even if the subjects being discussed are serious. When meeting with Anglophones, meetings may seem more democratic as all participants will engage and contribute. Meetings with Francophones, due to a greater respect for hierarchy and position, may revolve more around the most senior attendees.

- Meetings in Canadian companies are used to review proposals, make plans, brainstorm and communicate decisions. Attendees will generally represent a variety of levels and experiences; all are expected to express opinions.
- When presenting information, it is important to have facts and figures to substantiate claims and promises. Canadians are essentially rational and logical and thus they will not be convinced by emotions, passion or feelings.

### Dining and Entertainment

- Never beckon a waiter or waitress by snapping your fingers or shouting.
- The host normally offers first toast. Wait until everyone is served wine and a toast is proposed before drinking. It is acceptable for women to propose a toast.
- Business entertainment is common, but the focus usually remains on business.

The person who invites is normally expected to pay.

- Etiquette and formalities are more important in Canada than in the United States.
- While continental-style table manners are employed in Quebec, American style table manners are seen in other parts of the country.
- Eating while walking or standing on the street in Quebec is considered bad form.
- Table manners are relatively relaxed and informal in Canada.
- Table manners are generally Continental, i.e. the fork is held in the left hand and the knife in the right while eating.
- Wait to be shown to your seat.
- Do not rest your elbows on the table.

- Feel free to refuse individual foods or drink without offering an explanation. (no means no and will not be offered again)
- Leaving a small amount at the end of the meal is generally acceptable.

### Dress

Generally speaking, Canadians dress more conservatively (and more formally when going out) although practices vary by region. For business meetings, men should wear suits and ties; women should wear conservative suits or dresses.

### Gifts

- Bring flowers, fine wine or chocolates for the hostess when invited to a Canadian home.
- Avoid red roses (associated with romantic love) and white lilies (associated with funerals).
- In general, Canadians give gifts for birthdays and Christmas.
- If invited to someone's home for dinner, take a box of good chocolates, flowers or a bottle of wine.
- Do not give white lilies as they are used at funerals. Gifts are usually opened when received.

### Helpful Hints

- Do your homework about Canada. Most Americans are appallingly ignorant of Canadian history, culture and geography.

- Recognize that important regional differences exist in Canada and prepare to adapt.
- When in Quebec, learn a little French; Québécois greatly appreciate it when you take the effort to talk to them in their native language.
- Do not compare Canada with the United States.
- Do not use the term "Native Americans" to refer to indigenous peoples. Many Canadians find the term offensive. Canadians refer to members of these groups as "people of the First Nations."

### Canadian Communication Styles

It is difficult to specify any national trait in terms of communication in Canada due to its regionalism and cultural diversity. However, there are some basic communication styles that are fairly standard across the country. For example, businesspeople are generally polite, easy-going and somewhat informal. In general, communication is "moderately indirect" perhaps reflecting an amalgamation of both North American and British tendencies. Although most Canadians can disagree openly when necessary, they prefer to do so with tact and diplomacy. Their communication style is essentially pragmatic and relies on common sense. If you come from a culture where communication is very direct, you may wish to soften your demeanour and tone so as not to appear threatening. Communication styles vary most between Anglophone and Francophone parts of the country. Francophones are generally

more indirect than Anglophones, although less so than the French. They also tend to be more exuberant than Anglophones. Anglophones do not generally interrupt someone who is speaking. They consider it rude not to let a person complete their thought before entering

the discussion. Francophones are more likely to interrupt another speaker.

Canadians communicate more by the spoken word rather than non-verbal expressions. Non-verbal expressions are only really used to add emphasis

to a message or are part of an individual's personal communication style.

Canadians like their space and prefer to be at an arm's length when speaking to someone. Canadians are reticent to discuss their personal lives with business associates. They expect people to speak in a straightforward manner and to be able to back up their claims with examples. They do not make exaggerated claims and are suspicious of something that sounds too good to be true.

## Tipping

In restaurants gratuities are seldom included in Canadian restaurants. It is customary to tip approximately 15% on the total bill before tax, 20% for exceptional service. Approximately because tipping is personal and if 10% is your personal choice then tip 10%; but 15% is customary and (rightly or wrongly) expected. Many restaurants may charge an automatic 15% or more gratuity for larger groups so check your bill.



In hotels it is also a good idea to tip in hotels. Tipping at hotels does not stop with the hotel staff that brings baggage to a guest room. It is also the room service, cleaner, valet service, the hotel concierge

Tipping is also customary for other service providers such as hairdressers, manicurists, aestheticians and taxi drivers. In these cases the percentage of tip is really up to the individual, but 10% minimum is common.

In some tourist destinations, "tips jars" have started appearing in places that provide counter service -- coffee shops, ice cream shops, cafeterias etc. , and even in some retail stores. It is not necessary to tip for counter service, and it is definitely not customary to tip the clerk in retail stores.

Tipping is your choice, and it is common to tip in restaurants, but it is not required.

### Canadian etiquette at work

Every workplace has its own culture and often the easiest way to figure out what that culture is, is to observe and ask. Conformity isn't always necessary but you may want to establish yourself first before you break away from the way most people do things. Let's review some of the things you need to be aware of at the interview and on the job.

### The Interview

First Impressions: Your first impression in the interview involves your smile, handshake, clothes, perfume or cologne and personal space. You can never be too

good at making a good impression. Use mild perfume as the interviewer could be allergic to perfume.

**Fibbing/Lying:** You want to produce the best résumé possible and give a good impression in the interview. But using false information can get you fired, labeled a liar and thus won't help improve your self-esteem even if you look a lot better on paper.

**Table Manners:** Some interviews occur over lunch. This is an opportunity for the interviewer to see you in another environment and is not a good time for you to order the most expensive item and relax with a few drinks. If you aren't sure what to do and watching others isn't possible, eat with confidence and if it isn't correct, maybe the interviewer will think he or she is wrong. However, do not try to correct the interviewer's eating habits! In Canada we wait until everyone is served before we begin eating. Eat slow, chew with closed mouth and not make noise while chewing. Don't talk with your mouth full. (make sure you don't have food stuck on your front teeth at anytime when you are in public as it speaks to poor hygiene)

**Don't Receive Phone Calls:** If you have forgotten to turn off your cell phone, turn it off when it rings and apologize. Don't even think of answering it when you are in an interview. **Which Chair?** Normally you wait to be offered a chair when you come into the interview room. If this doesn't happen, ask where you should sit.

Don't assume you know where they want you to sit. You could end up taking the boss' chair, which as you know isn't a good situation.

Answering the Question: An interview is your opportunity to sell yourself.

Failure to answer the specific question asked will not help you in the interview.

Normally you will be given time to ask questions and/or add

information that you think is relevant. Be sure to keep your answers focused and reasonably brief. Watch the interviewer's body language for clues on how you are doing.

Thank You For The Interview: It is expected that you send a short thank you note by mail or email after an interview. It is also a good way for you to add anything you forgot to say in the interview.

Answering Machines & Messages: It is a good idea to have an answering machine on your phone to catch potential opportunities whether they are work or social. Your message should be clear and say nothing you would be embarrassed for an employer or your grandmother to hear.

E-mail Names: If your e-mail reflects your spirit and individuality but is not appropriate for everyone, it may be better to have 2 e-mail addresses.

Hottie\_girl@mail.net is fine for your friends but not appropriate for job search.

Are You Talking To Me?: When talking with someone, looking him or her in the

eye is considered respectful. If you have difficulty with this, imagine an eye in the middle of his or her forehead and speak to that. He/she will not be able to tell the difference.

## On the Job

Proper Introductions: It is expected that you will introduce the people you know

to the people you are talking to. If your mind goes blank and you forget someone's name, apologize and ask to be reminded. If you have been brought up in a culture where names are treated differently, i.e. Ms. Joan Smith is Ms. Joan, it is important to know that someone's title is used with their last name only, "Ms. Smith"

Appointments: If you have an appointment to meet someone or a group of people

and you are unable to go, don't assume that you won't be missed. You will need to do your best to cancel the appointment as early as possible. Try to never be late for meetings...especially your performance review.

Mind Your Own Business: Although it is usually best to be friendly with your co-

workers, do not ask directly about their personal affairs. If a co-worker shares with you personal details that make you uncomfortable, change the subject.

Greeting Co-workers : When you see your co-workers for the first time in the

day, you will want to offer a greeting. It is not necessary after that to greet

them every time you see them, although in some cultures it would seem rude not to.

**Dealing with Other Employees:** You are all in this together. It is best to try and maintain good relationships with everyone and at every level. If someone treats you badly you can assume he/she is having personal problems and

forgive him/her. This is true the first time only. The second time you need to address the situation calmly, kindly but directly. Be aware of the Workplace Harassment (sexual, verbal, physical) policy.

**Dealing with the Boss:** Bosses are generally treated a little more formally than others at your workplace. You may have to make appointments to discuss matters with your boss, while you can often drop by to speak to co-workers.

**Doors:** Holding doors open used to be very important for men when they were entering a door with a woman. Now the only thing you really need to know is to notice if there is someone behind you and not let the door close in his or her face.

**Gossip On The Elevator & Public Transit :** If you are telling someone something that not everyone should hear, don't tell it in an elevator with even 1 stranger. Remember that an elevator is a closed space; lower your voice when speaking. This also goes for public transit, like the TTC/Subway.

**Multicultural Dealings :** If you believe you will be dealing with people from

another culture who require a different set of manners, you might want to do some research on what is expected. The Internet makes this research very easy.

Most mistakes are forgiven at least in the beginning. But after that, try to adapt your manners to the culture you will be involved with.

In the online application, you will be asked for:personal information - full name, address and other information to establish your identity general information about your teacher education program - what it has prepared you to teach, and where you completed it or are enrolled (Step 1, Teacher Education) details of your teacher education program, including supervised practice teaching (Step 2, Teacher Education Program)

details of your academic or technological qualifications (Step 3, Academic or Technological Qualifications) details of any previous teacher certification or teaching experience (not supervised practice

teaching) that you may have (Step 4, Teacher Certification and Teaching Experience). We require complete information to determine whether or not you meet the requirements for certification in Ontario. The College does not accept assessments of your qualifications made by other organizations, for example, WES evaluation .

You must provide complete information in all of the sections above. For example, if you are already certified to teach in another jurisdiction, you must click on Add Another Teacher Certification and a new box will open so you can fill in the additional information.

It is very important that you provide accurate, full information in your application. Providing false information to the College is professional misconduct and could be punishable by penalties as serious as revocation of a teaching licence.

In Step 5, you will be required to complete a declaration about your suitability to be certified. If you answer Yes to any of the questions, a text box will open so you can provide full details.

Step 6 will display a summary of the information you have provided, and at Step 7 you pay the fees that are required to process your application. When the College determines you are eligible, you will be required to pay the Annual Membership Fee.

As you will see in your registration guide, documents that provide proof of your identity, qualifications and fitness to teach are also required to complete your application.

Some of these documents must be received by the College directly from the granting or issuing institutions, while we can accept other documents directly from applicants.

When submitting documents to the College, it is important to follow requirements set out in the registration guides to avoid delays. For example, if a transcript is not received directly from the institution or does not contain all

of the required information it will not be accepted. Please review the registration guide carefully to ensure the documents required for your application are submitted correctly.

### **13. Driving & Transit**

#### **1. Driving:-**

Graduated Licensing System for Passenger Vehicles:-

**Learner's permit (G1):** Available at the age of 16, with the passing of a



multiple choice road theory test and an eye vision test(G1 test), a G1 license is issued which allows the learning driver to drive on roads accompanied by

someone with full valid driver's license whose blood alcohol content (BAC) is less than 0.05. The driver also cannot drive on 400-series highways and other high-speed expressways (unless accompanied by a licensed instructor) or between 12:00 AM – 5:00 AM and must maintain their own BAC at zero.

**Probationary licence (G2):** Available after having held a G1 license for 12 months, or eight months if the driver has completed and passed a ministry-approved driver education course. Probationary license is acquired after successfully completing a road test. At this point, the driver must still maintain a BAC of zero. As of September, 2005, teenage drivers with a G2 licence are restricted in the number of passengers under 19 that they can carry during night-time driving.[19]

**Full license (G):** After 1 year of possessing the G2 license, a driver can take an additional road test that often includes driving on a four lane divided highway. With successful completion, they will obtain a full license, which carries no restrictions and are not required to take any further tests until the age of 80, provided they renew their license every five years.[20] Drivers aged 21 and under must still have a blood alcohol level of 0, even with a full G license. Drivers 80 and over must complete a vision and knowledge test and participate in a 90-minute group education session to renew their license, and the maximum number of years that a license can be issued for is two years.

Visit your closest “Drive Test Driver Examination Centre” and must bring personal identification (originals only). If any transcript is brought from country , it must produced in the centre within 6 months , the valid period . As they accept the transcript they may allow to do G2 within 12 months .

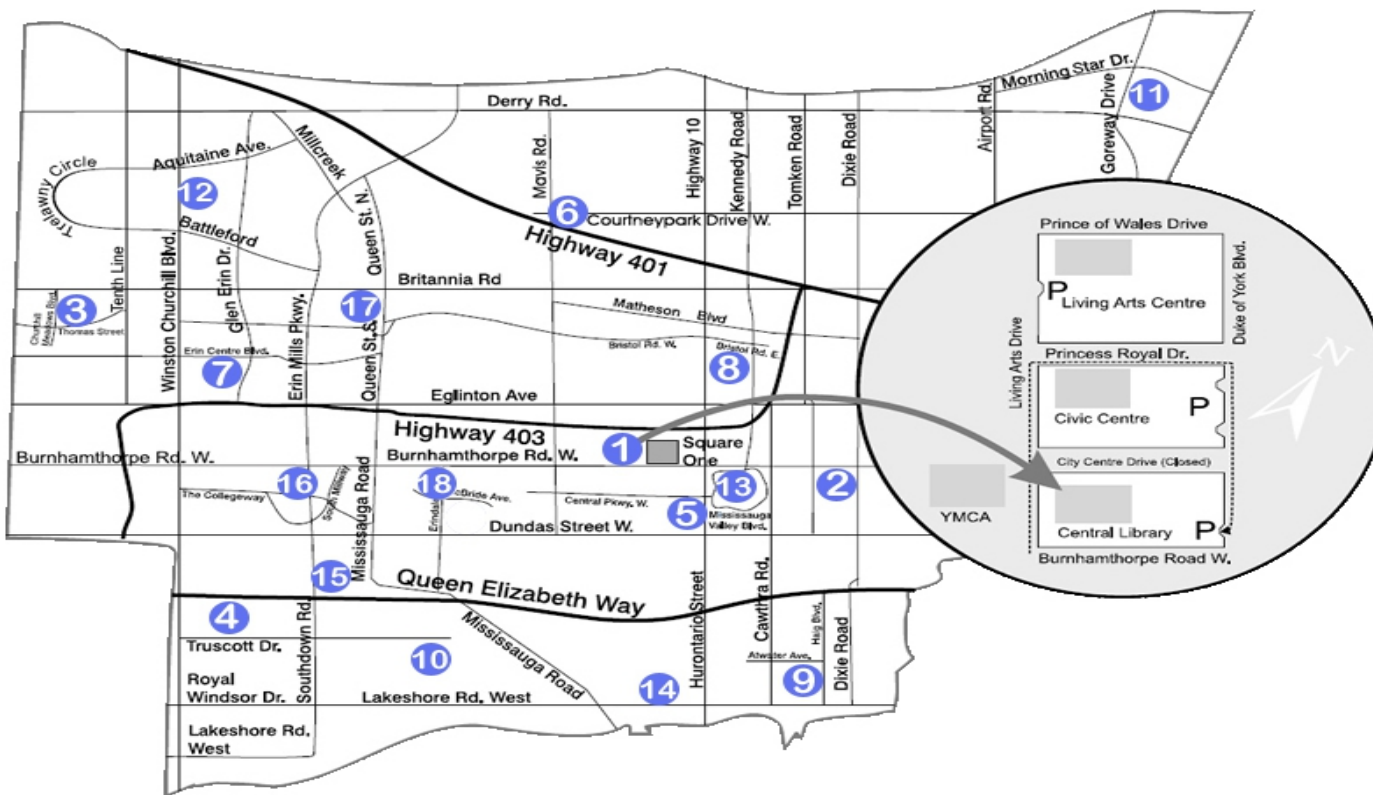

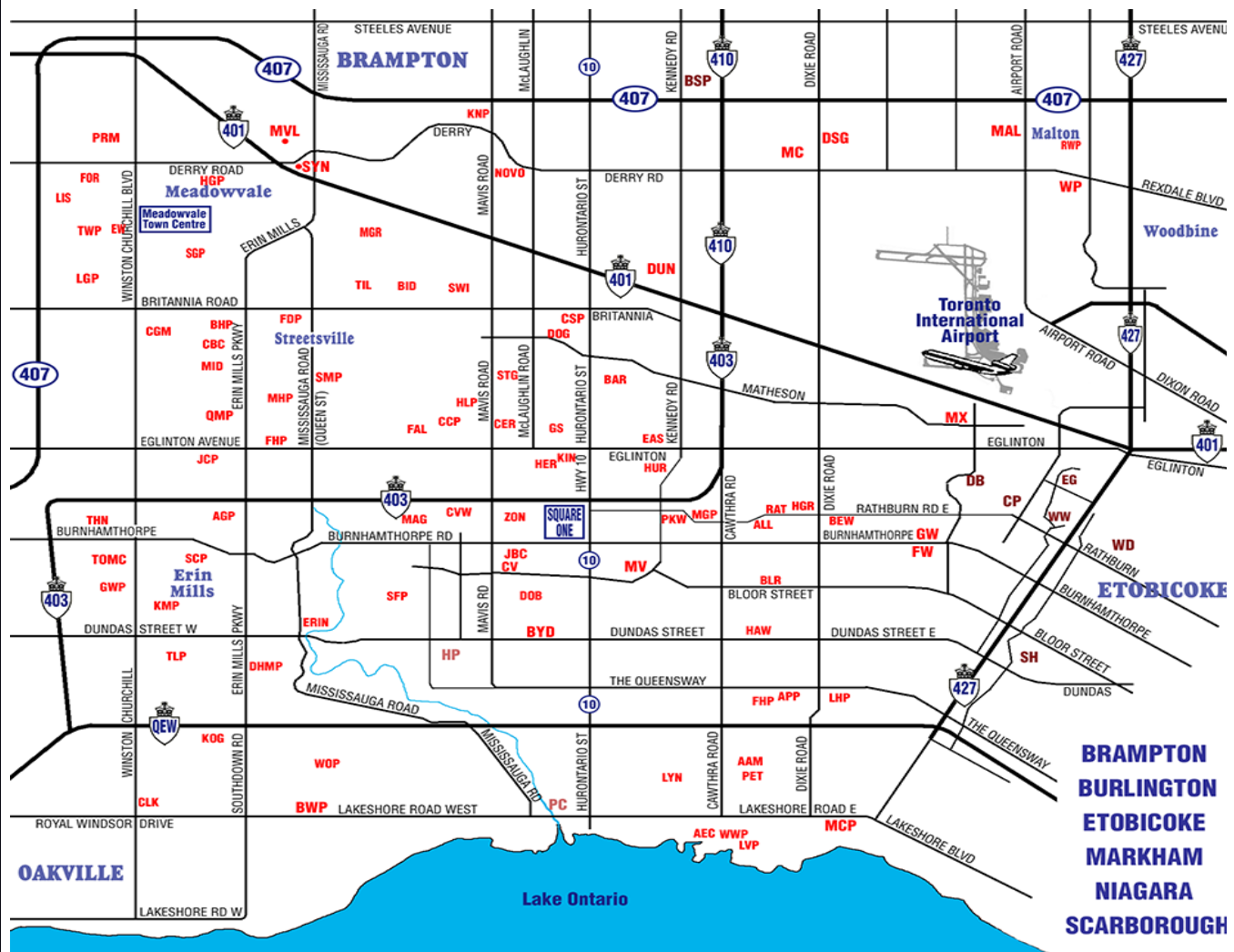

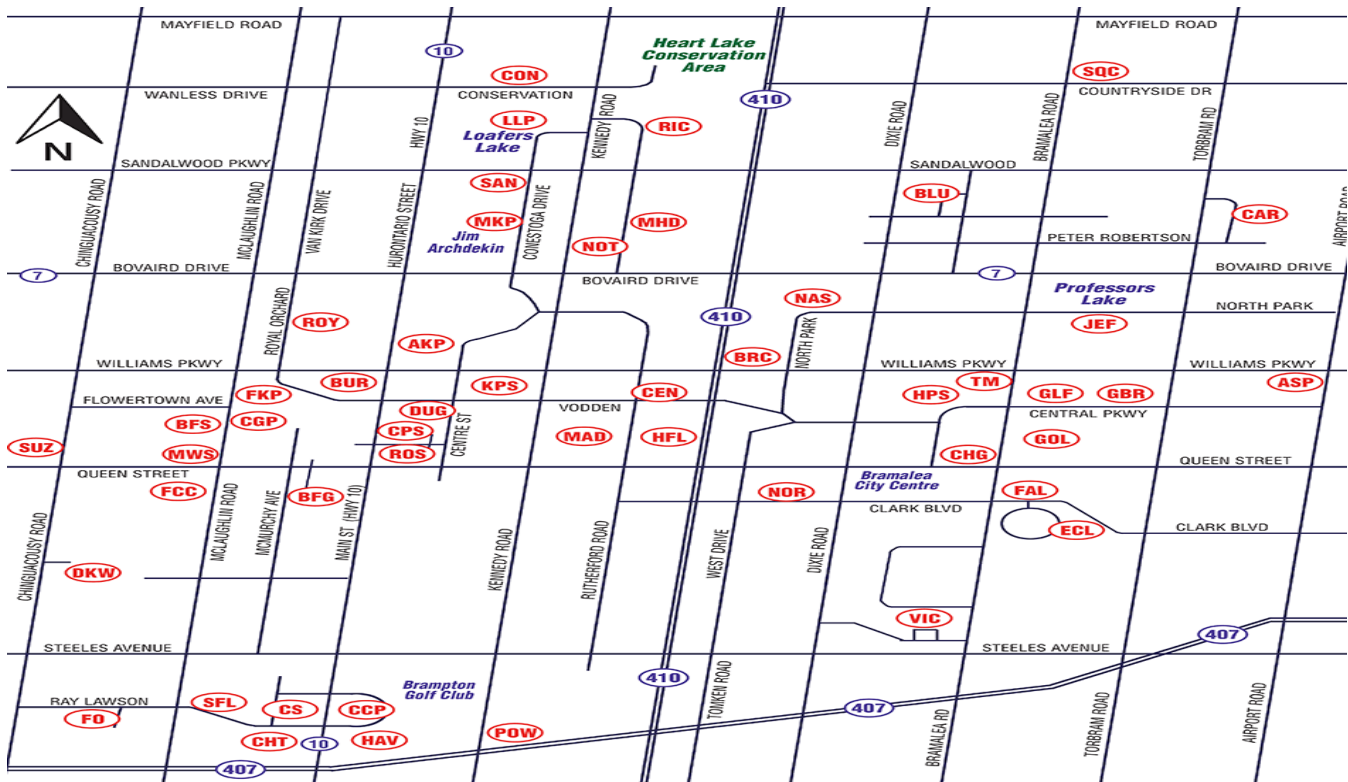
